

Space selfie

Selfies may sometimes be annoying on Earth, but there is a certain gravitas to one taken by a spacecraft on a mission. In this shot the European Space Agency's Rosetta probe is seen 50 kilometres from the comet 67P/Churyumov–Gerasimenko, which it is now orbiting.

Bárðarbunga blast

Iceland's Bárðarbunga erupted on 29 August after a swarm of seismic tremors had heralded trouble. The advance notice was a boon to volcanologists, who were able to draw up a metaphorical chair and make popcom before observing the eruption in detail. "This is absolutely unique — we've never had anything like it," says Agust Gudmundsson, a geologist at Royal Holloway University of London.

Ant in parasitic peril

Bemardo Segura

Entomologist Bernardo Segura suggests that the parasitic fly shown here attacking an ant was attracted to alarm pheromones released during an ant war against a rival nest, as described in a paper Segura recently co-authored¹. Segura, who is at the University of Chile in Santiago, won a prize in the 2014 *BMC* Ecology image competition for this image.

Yosemite aflame
