Additionally, I would like to announce two new features that will begin later this year in *Spinal Cord Series and Cases*. Soon we will be starting a special feature entitled Spinal Cord Pulse. We will be holding regular online surveys of the SCI community to see their thoughts on current clinical practices and issues and publish the results regularly as journal articles. Additionally we will have a point-counterpoint feature to discuss controversies in management in spinal cord injury.
