The 2000 Annual Clinical Genetics Meeting carries on the traditions of past conferences in presenting both research and clinical topics to promote the science and the practice of clinical genetics. Topics range from the investigation of the etiology and pathogenesis of disease to the delivery of genetic services and the ethical, legal and public policy issues that arise in the laboratory, the clinic, and regulatory agencies.

NEW MEETING FEATURES: THURSDAY

For the first time, the ACMG is offering special sessions on the half-day prior to the usual start of the meeting. In 2000, **three didactic sessions** will address the need to learn advanced counseling techniques, to design consent forms, and to use coding and billing advantageously. There is no additional charge for these sessions, but attendance in the counseling session is limited to those who pre-apply. In addition, the **Society for Inherited Metabolic Disorders** will present a special evening workshop.

STANDARD MEETING FEATURES: FRIDAY-SUNDAY

Plenary Sessions have been organized to highlight a wide range of topics designed to inform genetics practitioners, researchers and counselors. Sessions will feature experts who will describe advances in many areas of interest and importance to research and practice.
