Podcast: *Jurassic World*, dinosaur names and DNA from an ancient American

Three of the biggest palaeontology fans on Nature's staff join host Kerri Smith to sink their teeth into new film Jurassic World, which premiered this month. Plus, DNA from an ancient human found in Washington State in the 1990s throws up questions of heritage. The team debates whether the skeleton should be preserved for scientific study or reburied, as some Native American communities would like.
