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IPCRG News

IPCRG Conference 28-31 May 2008, Seville, Spain

Nine hundred and thirty-two delegates from over 40 countries participated - double the size of previous meetings! We had a great conference with the now-typical mix of high quality real-life research, challenging debate and wit. Summaries of many of the sessions will be online soon at www.theipcrg.org. There is a tremendous sense of camaraderie and global interest developing amongst the IPCRG community. This was enhanced in Seville by the attendance of delegates from many low and middle income countries and by excellent simultaneous translation that enabled our Hispanic-speaking colleagues to participate equally. We hope that Miguel Roman, the Chair of the Conference Organising Committee and his team can now relax a little. Alan Kaplan and his team have now accepted the IPCRG conference torch that they will carry to Toronto in May 2010.

Research

The Research Sub-committee in Seville heard several excellent presentations from countries wishing to pilot our e-faculty reference 2008 - Bousquet et al. Allergy 2008;63(8):990-6. initiative to support a research-aspiring country to develop its capability. We have selected Vietnam as the pilot site and Sian Williams have already begun work with Ass Prof Lan and her team in Hochiminh. Alan Crockett will make the first visit in September, and Niels Chavannes will be working on setting up a pilot scheme on smoke and smoking reduction in November. A smoking prevalence of over 56% in men is a clear indication that there is work to do. We also hope to start work with our colleagues in Romania in 2009.

Niels will also represent the IPCRG at an important World

Health Organisation meeting to develop the WHO's noncommunicable disease research strategy.

A revised set of research needs assessment statements will be online shortly following debate during the Seville meeting.

Education

We are in the process of exploring partnerships to deliver educational materials to meet our members' needs. The results of our recent survey are now complete and we will be talking to partners over the next few months about how best to share all our existing resources and make them widely available.
