A special milestone

This year the British Dental Industry Association (BDIA, formerly known as the British Dental Trade Association [BDTA]) is celebrating its centenary, and the Association and its members are celebrating this 100th birthday throughout 2023. The BDIA has a proud history of serving and supporting the dental industry and dental professionals, including an 83-year relationship with our colleagues at the British Association of Dental Nurses (BADN), spearheading innovation and improvements in dental equipment and care, and now representing an industry worth over £900 million, employing over 3,000 people.

Formed as the Association of Dental Manufacturers and Traders in June 1923 by eight dental companies, the Association rapidly expanded and has worked for 100 years for the benefit of its members, all dental professionals, and the public, having continually evolved to meet the ever-changing demands of the industry and the whole dental sector. The centenary marks a very significant milestone for the Association and its 100+ members, some of which can trace lineage back to those very first members 100 years ago.

Governed by a Council of member company executives since its creation, the Association has had 71 presidents, six Chief Executives, set up over 25 committees and held over 500 Council meetings since being established in 1923. As always, the BDIA Council and President remain instrumental in focusing the direction of the Association and in setting its aims and objectives to support its vision of working with its members to the benefit of the industry, customers and oral health, to ensure that the Association continues to offer the industry the best service, support, communications, events and more.

What is absolutely apparent in my job as Chief Executive is that the Association has a very proud history and tradition, whilst also being forward looking and adaptable to change. Every time I sit in our Board Room the gilded names of our Presidents past shine down on me from our two impressive


