DEVONPORT DENTAL EDUCATION CLINIC OPENS

The Peninsula Dental School Dental Education Clinic at Devonport, Plymouth, has been officially opened by Lord Colwyn, Deputy Speaker of the House of Lords and Vice-Chair of the House of Lords Dentistry Group.

The Devonport Dental Education Clinic is a purpose built dental education facility which has 40 dental chairs arranged in five bays of eight, plus three single chair bays. It also includes seminar rooms and an IT suite along with a laboratory where students will learn clinical skills for procedures such as casting models, adjusting dentures and making mouth guards.

A range of dental care is available free of charge from dental students under the supervision of a qualified dental tutor. Treatments and services include dental check-ups, oral examinations and diagnosis including X-rays and fillings and extractions. The Dental Education Clinic is primarily an NHS training clinic for dental students. Should a patient require a treatment that is currently not provided by dental students, they will be treated at the Dental Education Clinic by qualified dental staff or referred to

other the dental units in the city. Professor Wendy Purcell, Vice-Chancellor and Chief Executive of the University of Plymouth said, 'As a key partner in the Peninsula Dental School, the University of Plymouth is committed to leading transformational change in the city and region. I consider that this new facility will play a vital role in furthering the regeneration of the city of Plymouth as well as offering free community access to an important health service.'

TRACK CPD ONLINE

From August this year, all General Dental Council (GDC) registrants will be able to track and submit continuing professional development (CPD) returns online for the first time.

The new online facility will allow professionals to track and record CPD hours over their five-year cycle at the click of a mouse. If they have previously submitted paper forms, they will be able to edit and add hours from their current five-year cycle online. Once they have entered their hours for this year, the site will tell them how many hours they have left to do.


Around 47,000 dental care professionals need to provide an annual declaration of continuing professional development (CPD) hours this summer. All dental care professionals who registered with the GDC before 30 July 2008 and paid the annual retention fee by 31 July this year will receive a letter with instructions on how they can log on to the eGDC website and fill in their annual CPD hours electronically.

ORAL HEALTH AND MEMORY INVESTIGATED

American researchers have received \$1.3 million funding to research the

link between oral health and memory. The National Institutes of Health has



awarded the grant to a team led by Dr Bei Wu, a gerontologist at the University of North Carolina and Dr Richard Crout, an expert on gum disease and associate dean for research in the West Virginia University School of Dentistry, who will continue with a program testing oral health and memory in 273 people aged 70 who underwent brain function testing, dental evaluations and blood tests to check for inflammatory proteins associated with poor cognitive function.

Although previous research has associated oral health with overall health problems, including dementia, no studies have made clear how the state of the teeth and mouth affect mental function. The new funding will establish larger studies looking for links between oral health and brain function over time, while scientists will also seek to establish a link between improved cognitive function and better oral hygiene through intervention to improve oral health.

NEW TENDER WORKSHOPS ANNOUNCED

The British Dental Association, in association with Henry Schein, is to offer a series of practical and interactive two-day workshops on how to tender for NHS contracts. INTERIM DEAN APPOINTED

Professor Liz Kay, Dean of the Peninsula Dental School, has been chosen to become the Interim Dean for the Peninsula College of Medicine and Dentistry when the current Dean, Professor Sir John Tooke, leaves the organisation to join University College London as Vice Provost (Health), Head of the UCL School of Life and Medical Sciences and Head of the UCL Medical School.

appointed at some time in the coming academic year.

HALTING HOSPITAL-ACQUIRED INFECTION

Scientists from University College London (UCL) have created light-activated antimicrobial surfaces that could help fight the spread of hospital-acquired infection (HAI).

Professor Mike Wilson, Dr Jon Pratten and Dr Stefano Perni of UCL Eastman Dental Institute together with Professor Ivan Parkin of UCL Chemistry, working with colleagues in the UK and Spain, have developed a groundbreaking way to modify silicone so that it kills microbes when exposed to light from a laser or from ordinary fluorescent lamps.

Silicone is a polymer which is used to make medical devices such as catheters, but bacteria can colonise its surface and infections associated with catheter use are a major cause of HAIs. The novel material is produced by incorporating a light-activated antimicrobial agent and gold nanoparticles into the polymer so that on exposure to light, highly reactive molecules are generated that kill any microbes on the polymer's surface.

A catheter made from such a material could, therefore, be kept free of live microbes by periodic irradiation from a small, inexpensive laser diode attached to it.

These light-activated antimicrobial polymers have the added advantage that microbes are very unlikely to develop resistance to them. As they are also activated by light from ordinary fluorescent lamps, they could also be used to coat surfaces (eg floors, doors, desks etc), thereby helping to reduce the number of pathogenic bacteria, viruses and fungi in the hospital and dental healthcare environment.
