## BDJ WORLD WAR I COVER SERIES PRINTS

Rachel Bairsto, Curator at the BDA Museum, has received 12 limited edition signed prints made from the original watercolours that were featured on the front covers of volume 217 issues of the *British Dental Journal* from Colonel James Hardy, a Trustee of the Army Medical Services Museum. The watercolours depicted scenes that related to military dentistry during the First World War, many of which were inspired by objects and photographs from the BDA Museum's collection.

Generous donations made by past members of the Royal Army Dental Corps meant that sufficient funds were raised to allow the Dental Archive of the Army Medical Services Museum to purchase and frame the original watercolours painted by the illustrator Philip Bannister. The watercolours will shortly form part of a permanent exhibition on display in the Army Medical Services Museum.

### DENTAL PROFESSION TAKES A LEAD ON ANTIBIOTIC RESISTANCE

The British Dental Association (BDA) has called on patients and policymakers to help dentists rise to the challenge presented by antimicrobial resistance (AMR) in dentistry, as the National Institute for Health and Care Excellence (NICE) calls for a curb on inappropriate antibiotic prescribing in the NHS.

The World Health Organisation has identified AMR as a serious threat to public health worldwide. The BDA set out a blueprint for the action on AMR, launched at its annual conference in May, and is now working with national leaders and international experts to combat the risks.

Dr Graham Stokes, Chair of the BDA Health and Science Committee said: 'Antibiotics

won't cure an abscess, so patients shouldn't be surprised when their dentist suggests treatment other than a prescription.

'Dentists are already subject to regulation to ensure prescriptions can be justified. What we don't have is a contract that provides adequate time for dentists to treat emergency cases. So we call on the government to recognise the real threat of AMR and factor this into any reformed package.

'This danger presented by antibiotic resistance requires a change in gear from practitioners, patients and policymakers. The simple message is we can't go on as we are, and the dental profession is stepping up and taking a lead.'
